

## Vespers propers, December 10


**The holy martyrs Menas, Hermogenes and Eucraphus.** Menas and Hermogenes were born in Athens and moved to Constantinople. Both were pagans. Menas was sent by the Emperor Maximian to calm the strife between pagans and Christians in Alexandria. While there, he became a Christian. The emperor sent Hermogenes to Alexandria to punish Menas. After a miracle that happened during Menas' trial, Hermogenes became a Christian. Then the emperor himself came to Egypt and put both men to harsh torture. Upon seeing their valor, Eucraphus, who was Menas' secretary, denounced himself to the emperor. He had all three beheaded. (4th century)


**Cantor:** (Tone 1) Because with the Lord there is mercy and fullness of redemption,


O Me-nas, il-lus-tri-ous mar-tyr, you were cruel-ly beaten
