

Vespers propers, December 10, 2023
Twenty-eighth Sunday after Pentecost

The holy martyrs Menas, Hermogenes and Eugraphus. Menas and Hermogenes were born in Athens and moved to Constantinople. Both were pagans. Menas was sent by the Emperor Maximian to calm the strife between pagans and Christians in Alexandria. While there, he became a Christian. The emperor sent Hermogenes to Alexandria to punish Menas. After a miracle that happened during Menas' trial, Hermogenes became a Christian. Then the emperor himself came to Egypt and put both men to harsh torture. Upon seeing their valor, Eugraphus, who was Menas' secretary, denounced himself to the emperor. He had all three beheaded. (4th century)

Lamplighting Psalms in the Tone of the Week (Tone 3, p. 48), stichera 10-4. Then:


Cantor: (Tone 1) Because with the Lord there is mercy and fullness of redemption,

(on 2) acclaim him all you peoples!


